• It doesn't take long to see that the writer of Proverbs is primarily concerned with the nurturing of spiritual wealth. Wisdom herself is presented as precious and valuable (2:1-5, 3:13-17, 8:10-11, 8:18-21). Other things are similarly framed as treasures that exceed gold and jewels (honor for the Lord, a godly spouse, charitable heart, diligent work ethic, committed friends, discretion in speech, etc.).

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- So when we observe the sluggard being lazy in



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- But the well-meaning cat nap can slide so easily into deep ineffectiveness, especially when it becomes habitual. Take worship, for example. Hebrews 10:25 isn't about "missing church" it's about slacking discipleship. This manifests itself in a habitual lack of seriousness and discipline when it comes to our obligations to each other and God.



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- At some point, dormant Christians needs to "wake up rise from the dead, and make the



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- Revelation 3:14ff For many, the problem isn't about immense suffering or blaming God for having "hard luck." It's the great level of physical comfort that keeps us neatly distracted from our deep spiritual poverty.
- Don't we do this on purpose in many areas of life? When we're undergoing a painful procedure we want to be distracted. Bored in a waiting room? YouTube! Conflict in relationships? Go shopping and feel better! Depressed? Grieving? Lonely?


Let's be clear about this: it is insulting to sit in a position of comfort and make patronizing statements about the "nobility" of the poor. But one thing can be said: At least the poor know they're poor. I wouldn't trade my life for anybody else's, but I should strive for clarity and awareness about where I stand with God (Mk. 2:17).

 QUESTION THE LONG-TERM VALUE OF YOUR INVESTMENTS IN THIS WORLD
