5 THOUGHTS ON MORAL EXCELLENCE

- It begins with accepting divine direction
- It is fostered by setting the right expectations

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SETTING EXPECTATIONS

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- To be sure, the bar is set high for Christians! Remember Colossians 3:5-7, Ephesians 5:5, and Romans 12:1-2.
- Sadly, low expectations tend to get transferred to those around us, especially for those in positions of leadership (2 Chronicles 28:19, Hosea 4:6-10). We see this in parenting, in managing a business, in our language, in marriage, and in shepherding a church.

MORAL EXCELLENCE IS OUT OF PLACE

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- This is why we "keep our behavior excellent" (1 Peter 2:11-12) and produce "good fruit from a good tree" (Luke 6:43-45).

MORAL EXCELLENCE IS NEUTRALIZED BY MORAL SUPERIORITY



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- Cain wasn't mindful of sin crouching at the door.
- Lot wasn't mindful of his failed influence and impending danger.
- Samson wasn't mindful of the dangers of his own sense of invincibility.
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- Peter wasn't mindful of the way his boasting betrayed vulnerability.
- WE are capable of falling into the shadows too. Jesus reminds us that on a fundamental level, sin is sin. Functionally, anger and murder, lust and adultery, are different but on an elemental level they are not (Matthew 5:21-28). It's easy for me to compare myself favorably to others without realizing I am in danger. On the path to moral excellence I must learn to acknowledge the shadowy areas of my life (Ephesians 5:13, John 3:20).
